The 85th Annual Meeting of the Members of Osceola Electric Cooperative, Inc., (OEC) was held March 23, 2024 at the Osceola Electric Cooperative Inc., office in Sibley. Board and staff served coffee, juice, and rolls prior to the business meeting.

President Terrence Clark called the meeting to order and welcomed members attending the meeting.

Nominating Committee Chairperson Al Brueggeman reported the following individuals had been nominated as candidates for Director. Area 3: Lindsay Watterson, Area 4: Adam Hoekstra and Michael Raveling, Area 5: Doug Roth. Voting was done by both mail-in ballots prior to the meeting and ballots cast at the Annual Meeting. The results of the Director balloting: Area 3: Lindsay Watterson, Area 4: Adam Hoekstra, and Area 5: Doug Roth. Articles of Incorporation change to Article VIII to extend Director term limits to 18 years from 12 years passed by 77 percent.

Dean Haspels, Secretary/Treasurer gave the financial report. OEC had revenue from the sale of electricity \$8,071,937. Other services, interest, capital credits provided OEC with a total revenue of \$8,860,103. OEC expenses from purchased power were \$5,763,068 or 70 percent of OEC expenses. Other expenses, operations, maintenance, consumer accounting

and information, administrative, depreciation and interest expense totaled \$8,194,357 leaving margins of \$665,746 for 2023.

Manager Jeff TenNapel reported on the activities of the Cooperative. Construction Work Plan projects completed and an update on OEC line crew construction for 2023. Legislative and power supplier updates were reported on. Safety milestone of 1,752 days safe – no lost time away from work was discussed. Steve Voss was honored for his service to the membership. Steve retired after reaching the 12 year term limit.

A reorganizational meeting was held. Officers are Terrence Clark as President, Derek Ackerman as Vice President and Dean Haspels as Secretary/Treasurer. Also, three L&O Directors were elected: Adam Hoekstra, Dean Haspels and Terrence Clark.

This member only trip is \$150 per member. The fee includes the cost for the hotel, bus, all meals, riverboat, and snacks.



5 WAYS TO SAVE THIS SUMMER


When summer temperatures rise, so do our energy bills. Here are a few ways you can reduce energy use and grow your summer savings.

- Raise your thermostat.
 The smaller the difference between the indoor and outdoor temp, the more you'll save.
- Install window coverings like blinds or light-blocking curtains to prevent indoor heat gain during the day.

- Run ceiling fans for additional cooling but turn them off when you leave the room.

Feenstra Visits OEC


U.S. Representative Randy Feenstra stopped by the Osceola Electric Cooperative office on Tuesday, April 23.

Member Recipe

Mother's Can't-Leave-Alone Bars Julie Stahly

- 1 pkg white cake mix
- 2 eggs
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 1 can sweetened condensed milk
- 1 cup chocolate chips
- 1/4 cup butter

Combine cake mix, eggs, and oil. With floured hands press 2/3 of mixture into greased 9x13 pan. Set aside the remaining mixture. In microwave dish, combine sweetened condensed milk, chocolate chips, and butter. Microwave until smooth (approx. 45 seconds) Pour over crust. Drop the remaining dough over top (flatten out pieces and place them on the bars). Bake 350° for about 20-25 minutes. Enjoy!!
